

Joanne Suarez, MBe (she/ella) is an early-career researcher and seasoned public health practitioner trained in bioethics, she is also the Founder and Executive Director of Prospera Institute; an early-stage nonprofit exploring ethical and moral issues at the intersection of Latinx health, culture and society. Her research interest lie at the intersection of public health, bioethics, racial health equity, and exploring how public policies facilitate or hinder health prosperity for the U.S LatinX diaspora.

Ms. Suarez has worked in local government, community healthcare centers and public health programs serving Boston's most underserved communities for over 12 years. Her experiences

include leading operations and fiscal oversight for City of Boston's Community Engagement Cabinet; co-leading a grassroots coalition of 400 public health practitioners seeking to reform the Massachusetts Crisis Standard of Care policy during the COVID19 pandemic; working with medical students, healthcare professionals and community-based organizations to establish Harvard Medical Schools Office for Community Centered Medical Education (OCCME) and co-developing a low intensity psychological intervention program to help residents cope with day-to-day stressors.

In 2019, Ms. Suarez designed an ethical framework to address systemic inequities impacting LatinX communities and is expanding upon this work through Prospera Institute. Outside of her research endeavors, Ms. Suarez stays active in community serving on the Taylor and Francis Journal for Health Equity Editorial Board, Massachusetts Patient Advisory Committee, Boston Children's Hospital Ethics Advisory Committee, and being a capstone mentor with the Harvard Center for Bioethics.

Ms. Suarez is a black Dominican and first-generation student. She has a Master of Science in Bioethics from Harvard Medical School and a bachelor's in counseling psychology from Johnson and Wales University. She is currently a Master of Divinity candidate and Deans Fellow at Boston University, where she is also the Vice President of the Association of Black Seminarians.
